

The Ceremonial Parade

- Juniors' Bugle Band and Guard march on to salute the Captain on his arrival.
 Guard composed of Juniors from Duncan, Rodney and Exmouth Divisions.
 Piping Party from Keppel Division.
- A display of Rhythmic Physical Training and Cutlass Swinging given by 130 Juniors from 61 and 64 Recruitments; followed by Vaulting over a High Box, Trampoline and High Vaulting Table by Juniors from all Recruitments. Musical accompaniment by the Royal Marine Band.
- A display of marching and countermarching by the combined Juniors' Bugle Band and the Royal Marine Band of H.M.S. Ganges.
 The Ganges Juniors' Bugle Band is composed entirely of volunteers.
- 4. Field Gun Competition between crews of Juniors from Red, White and Blue Squadrons. (In this simplified version of the Royal Tournament Display, crews race up the course, changing gun and limber wheels and firing three rounds on the way. They then race back in a similar manner. The gun and limber weigh one ton).
- Mast Manning by Juniors from Hawke and Blake Divisions, assisted by the combined Royal Marine and Bugle Bands. (The Mast, 143¹/₄ feet high, was once the foremast of H.M.S. Cordelia).
- 6. Sunset Gun and Ceremonial Sunset.
 Colour Party from Exmouth Division.
- 7. Parade Disperses. Button Boy receives a silver coin (a crown piece) from the Captain.





King George's Fund for Sailors

This fund is recognised by the Ministry of Defence (Navy) and the Ministry of Transport as the central fund for the Officers and Men of the Royal Navy, Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleets.

The fund, instituted to support all British seafarers, makes allocations to no less than 120 benevolent and welfare societies covering the needs of those past and present who have, throughout our island history "Gone down to the sea in ships."

The Seven Rivers Cheshire Home

This home is one of the homes founded by Group Captain Leonard Cheshire, V.C., D.S.O., D.F.C., Royal Air Force, for patients who are unable to look after themselves.

H.M.S. Ganges has established a close liaison with the Seven Rivers Cheshire Home and teams of Juniors visit this home at week-ends as part of their character building training. These Juniors render invaluable assistance tending lawns and gardens, cleaning the home, and being generally helpful.

50% of the proceeds from the sale of programmes and button-holes today will be used in the purchase of materials, paint, linoleum, etc., to widen the scope of the assistance rendered to the Seven Rivers Cheshire Home by H.M.S. Ganges. The remaining 50% will be allocated to King George's Fund for Sailors.

The Enright Block

This latest addition to H.M.S. Ganges training facilities is named after Admiral Sir Philip King Enright who joined H.M.S. Ganges as a boy 2nd Class on 19th April, 1910, retiring as an Admiral after over 40 years of service. His decorations and medals which were presented to the Establishment by his sister, are displayed in the block. (Details of Admiral Enright's career can be studied at the South end of Nelson Hall).

The block is equipped with classrooms and with rooms to demonstrate guns, guided weapons and control systems, air and marine engineering and boiler mountings. It also has a fitting shop, stripping and assembling rooms, and two cinemas.

Nearby is a hangar housing Sea Venom and Seahawk aircraft and to seaward is a 4.5 in. Mk. V gun mounting (as used in a modern frigate) and a Close Range Blind Fire Director.

The Divisions

Red Squadron:

- ANSON. (Lt. M. J. Ebdon and Sub. Lt. (SD) (B) B. Houghton). Named after Admiral Lord Anson (1697-1762), who was prominent in actions against Spanish colonies in the New World. In 1747 he routed a French fleet, and captured 6 warships, 4 merchant ships and gold worth £300,000. Sailed round the world 1740-44.
- BENBOW. (Lt. Comdr. D. C. Spragge and Sub. Lt. (SD) (G) D. B. Thompson). Named after Vice-Admiral Benbow (1653-1792), Master of the Fleet in battles against the French off Beachy Head, Barfleur and La Hogue. He died fighting the French in the West Indies.
- FROBISHER. (Eng. Lt. J. L. Coumbe and Sub. Lt. (SD) (TAS) J. Calam). Named after Sir Martin Frobisher (1535-94), a great Elizabethan navigator, who tried three times to navigate the Northwest passage round Canada. He went with Drake to the West Indies, fought the Spanish Armada, and died fighting the French off Brest.
- GRENVILLE. (Lt. Comdr. J. M. Phillips and Eng. Lt. (O/E) R. W. Ellis). Named after Sir Richard Grenville (1541-91), who went to Virginia with his relative Sir Walter Raleigh and fought against the Armada. Best remembered for his gallant fight in the `Revenge' against the entire Spanish Fleet off the Azores.

White Squadron:

- COLLINGWOOD. (Lt. Comdr. A. E. Witt and Sub. Lt. (SD) (C) J. K. Dempsey). Named after Admiral Lord Collingwood (1750-1810) who took part in many noted battles in the time of Lord Howe and Lord Nelson 'The Glorious First of June,' St. Vincent, Trafalgar (where he was second in command to Lord Nelson).
- DRAKE. (Lt. Comdr. J. B. Leach and Sub. Lt. (SD) (C) W. J. Christie). Named after Sir Francis Drake (1540-96) who is well known for his exploits against the Spaniards. He was the first Englishman to see the Pacific, carried out a particularly bold raid against a Spanish fleet in Cadiz harbour, and played bowls at Plymouth while waiting for the Spanish Armada.
- EXMOUTH. (Lt. Comdr. M. Forder and Sub. Lt. (SD) (PR) M. J. Kearns). Named after Admiral Viscount Exmouth (1757-1833), who was prominent in Nelson's day. By bombarding Algiers he stopped Christian slavery in North Africa.
- HAWKE. (Lt. Comdr. P.1. McLean and Sub. Lt. (SD) (G) D. L. Rees). Named after Admiral Lord Hawke (1705-81), a great fighter against the French. He lived to become Admiral of the Fleet and First Lord of the Admiralty.

Blue Squadron:

- BLAKE. (Lt. Comdr. R. M. Lees and Sub. Lt. (SD) (B) J. Bloom). Named after General-at-Sea Blake (1598-1657), lawyer, member of parliament, soldier and fleet commander. He first supported Cromwell against the Royalists and then fought the Dutch and Spaniards at sea. A great naval reformer and organiser.
- DUNCAN. (Lt. Comdr. D. Stone and Sy. Sub. Lt. (Ck.) J. F. Earle). Named after Admiral Viscount Duncan (1731-1804), who fought the Spaniards for many years, and won a notable victory over the Dutch at Camperdown in 1797.
- KEPPEL. (Lt. Comdr. G. H. Griffin and Sub. Lt. (SD) (G) J. Mullen). Named after Admiral Viscount Keppel (1725-86), who sailed round the world with Anson. After many fights with the French he became First Lord of the Admiralty, a member of Parliament, and a Peer.
- RODNEY. (Lt. Comdr. J. R. Husk and Sub. Lt. (SD) (G) M. A. Pickstock). Named after Admiral Lord Rodney (1719-92) who took a distinguished part in many battles against the French and Spaniards. At the battle of Saintes he crushed a strong French Fleet
